CHAPTER V

CONCLUSION AND RECOMMENDATION

5.1 Conclusion

This research analysis and findings pertaining of to the examination of expressive illocutionary acts that were uttered in "The Summer I Turned Pretty" TV series allowed for the drawing of several key conclusions. First, in "The Summer I Turned Pretty" TV Series featured 13 different acts of expressive, including thank, apologize, greet, congratulate, praise, protest, complaint, lament, deplore, condole, compliment, boast, and welcome. The researcher found there are 4 data of thank, 2 data of apologize, 2 data of greeting, 2 data of congratulate, 3 data of praise, 2 data of protest, 2 data of complaint, 3 data of lament, 2 data of deplore, 1 data of condole, 3 data of compliment, 2 data of boast, and 3 data of welcome. The act of thank in "The Summer I Turned Pretty" TV Series are among the most dominant act of expressive deeds. The speakers and the hearers primarily used this style to show their thankfulness and expression of positive feeling to someone who has done service.

Regarding the second, the TV show "Inventing Anna" demonstrated 4 different function of expressive act. The function includes conflictive, convivial, collaborative, and competitive. The researcher found there are 20 data of convivial, 2 data of conflictive, 6 data of collaborative, and 3 data of competitive. he most typical use for expressive act functions is the convivial function. This function is frequently utilized by the speaker to express regret for the actions they have taken and to show polite to person's who have the speaker to the hearer.

5.2 Recommendation

When this research is finished, it includes recommendations for the English students who plan to apply the same research pragmatics. Consequently, more study is required to determine how expressive illocutionary acts are used in society, especially within the British community, for communication purposes. This is because English is a language that is widely spoken throughout the world and has developed into an international language that necessitates an understanding of the language, particularly an understanding of the intended meaning. The study's findings demonstrate how the communication context affects the usage of expressive illocutionary behaviors since various communication settings led to various interpretations and meanings.

The importance of expressive illocutionary acts in communication will be further highlighted by utilizing additional data sources.
