CHAPTER I

INTRODUCTION

1.1 Background of the Research

Gender asserts that an individual's identity is never fixed for this reason. Sexual conversation performance, physical look and performance, and sexual activity performance can all be used to determine gender identification (Butler, 1988).

Since social and literary works emerge as a form of cultural expression that expresses the values of society, literary works are often seen as portraits of the lives of the people surrounding the author or of social reality. Given the existence of literature as a socio-cultural product, women's problems are one of the problems being addressed, as they are consumed and created in a universal context. Concerns about women's underrepresentation in politics and socio-economics, particularly in comparison to men, have led to an increase in discussion about women in literature (Abrams, 1999).

The term "struggle" in a feminist context refers to initiatives taken to combat discrimination, gender inequity, and the oppression of women and other gender minorities. The fight for gender equality in a variety of spheres of life, including politics, economics, social issues, and culture, involves a range of modes of activity, advocacy, and resistance. Related with the struggle to determine the form of representation of women in literary works, this research focuses on the study of the novel written by Alice Walker in 1982 with the title The Color Purple. Alice Walker wasborn in Eatonton, Georgia, America on February 9, 1944. She is the little daughter of eight children of Willie Lee Walker and Minnie Tallulah Grant Walker who work as sharecroppers. Walker's childhood was filled with

violence and racism. This is very influential on his literary works. Moreover, the color purple novel is considered important to study because the problems discussed in it are universal humanitarian issues and are a reflection of the attitudes, views and ideals of a society. The values contained in it are very relevant to contemporary life and are considered useful for structuring a better future.

Literary works are the imaginative output of written language used to produce fiction or other creative works. Poetry, prose fiction, plays, essays, and other creative forms can be used for this. Literary works frequently convey a variety of ideas, values, and human experiences while entertaining, inspiring, and provoking thought through the use of complicated language, plots, conflicts, characters, and themes. The novel is one of the literary works that students frequently study for research projects.

The Color Purple Women's Themed novel actually addresses the issue of women seeking freedom and equality as people who coexist with other men. This is indicated by the efforts made by women to fulfill these aspirations, especially through education, labor, courage, and a positive attitude. Women's problems with The Color Purple in Rome state that women have always faced oppression and sexual harassment and were considered second-rate in society. Celie and Nettie give an explanation for this. Serry's stepfather has raped her numerous times up until the point where he has two kids.

"He beat me today because he says I winked at boy in church. Or dressing trampy he do it to me anyway." (Walker, 1982, p.7)

In addition, Celie did not find happiness in her life after marriage. Her husband did the same as his stepfather. She is always under pressure from her husband and she uses derogatory language to speak to him.

"He tell me, wash this. Iron that. Look for this. Look for that. Find He groan over holes in his sock." (Walker, 1982, p.16)

In addition, there is oppression in the family because women are only seen as wives or daughters, and wives or daughters must obey their fathers, men, or husband.

By using Simone de Beauvoir's existentialist conception of feminism, the two aforementioned phenomena may be further understood. Existentialism, according to De Beauvoir (1956), empowers women to live freely and make their own judgements about the future without assistance or direction from others. Women so make an effort to defend their rights in order to live for themselves. De Beauvoir (1956) noted that women make many attempts to achieve an existence, such as entering the workforce, becoming intelligent, and rejecting or otherness. Women will encounter challenges as long as they strive for it. De Beauvoir (1956) asserted that women will encounter two challenges, namely societal perspectives and self-doubt about societal perspectives.

Furthermore, because the plot is so amazing and fascinating to investigate, a lot of other researchers have also examined this book using a variety of methodologies and ideas.
